<u>Uniform</u>

All uniform and socks and shoes need to be **clearly named** (**in obvious places**). Your child needs a:

- coat on rainy and cold days and a sun hat and cream applied on sunny days.
- A pair of school shoes that are **Velcro** (no laces please)
- named water bottle in school everyday
- named book bag in school everyday (please purchase a bookbag from school rather than a big rucksack from a shop)
- Reading books and reading records in their book bags in school everyday.
- Spare change of **named** clothes including pants, socks, cheap/old shoes and extra uniform in case of accidents or they get messy outside in a PE bag which will be kept on their peg at all times.

Snacks

School provides children with a healthy snack every morning. Over recent years, we've found the children get hungry in the afternoon however we do not have enough snacks for both the morning and the afternoon. If you think your child will get hungry in the afternoons, please pop a healthy snack in their book bag.

<u>PE</u>

- Children should **come to school on Monday's** in their PE kits ready for PE in the afternoon.
- Indoor kit navy shorts, house t-shirt (red/yellow/green/blue) and black pumps
- Outdoor kit dark or navy tracksuit and trainers

Please send your child into school with Velcro trainers rather than laces.

Please note PE days are not non-uniform days and branded clothing is not allowed e.g. a red t shirt with a large logo on the front. If your child does not

Getting Organised

Reading books and phonics homework

Children are listened to read 1:1 once a week. This is in addition to daily whole class reading.

On a Thursday, your child will be given two reading books out of our EYFS/KS1 library. This needs to be returned on the following Wednesday in preparation to have a new book on Thursday. One book will mirror the sounds we have been learning at school. The second book will have a child text and parent text where you can share your child's book with them.

On a Thursday, your child will be given their phonics homework books which contain worksheets to complete. This needs to be returned on the following Wednesday in preparation to have new homework on Thursday. Overview of Half Termly Topics:

Autumn Term 1 — It's good to be me includes looking at ourselves, school, families, homes/houses around the world, people who help us and transport/vehicles.

Autumn Term 2 — **The world around us** is when we learn about Autumn, Diwali, fire safety, Remembrance, World rhyme week, the story of Grace and family and The Nativity.

Spring Term 1 — **Adventure above and below the clouds** includes learning about seasons/weather, Chinese New Year, space and under the sea.

Spring Term 2 — **Celebrations** involves learning about Noah's Ark. This term we also produce a Mothers' Day Assembly and learn about Easter and spring. A farm trip will also take place this term.

Summer Term 1 — Tell me a tale includes learning through traditional tales such as Jack and the Beanstalk, The three little pigs, The Three Billy Goats Gruff, Goldilocks and the three bears, Little Red Riding hood.

Summer Term 2 — **The Great Outdoors** is our final topic of the year and includes learning about Farms and animals and reading the story Lighthouse Keepers lunch!



What is phonics?

Words are made of a combination of sounds. In the English language, there are 44 sounds but only 26 letters. Phonics teaches children to recognise the sounds that each letter or group of letters makes, how to put them together to read words and how to break them apart to spell words.

What is a phoneme?

A phoneme is the smallest unit of sound in speech. It is simply the speech sound that is made by the mouth. Each letter represents a sound for example, 'bat' has three phonemes: 'b', 'a' and 't'.


What is a grapheme?

A grapheme is the single letter or group of letters that we write to represent a sound (phoneme). Graphemes can be made up of 1, 2, 3 or 4 letters.

In FS2, children are taught Level 1+, Level 2 and Level 3 sounds. This is equivalent to phase 2 and 3.



Learning to read is one of the most important skills that your child will develop over the next few years. The more support and encouragement that you can offer your child, the more likely it is that he or she will make good progress.



At Meriden, we are using the Oxford Reading Tree series to take your child through the early stages of learning to read.



We are using the Floppy's Phonics teaching programme, which is a step-by-step phonics reading scheme. It introduces the children to

the letters and sounds (the alphabetic code) that are at the foundation of all reading and writing.

To reinforce the teaching in school, your child may bring home some books to share with you. These may be:

- Floppy's Phonics Decoding Practice books, to practise each set of new sounds and letters taught at school and consolidate learning.
- Floppy's Phonics decodable readers to practise reading stories and different text types.

All the books have notes on the inside cover to guide you on how to share

them with your child.
